

Year Six Checkpoint What is Cambridge Primary Checkpoint and what is it used for?

Cambridge Primary Checkpoint is a series of assessments for use in the final year of primary education. It enables school to obtain an international benchmark of learner performance to identify and address learning needs.

There are a number of ways in which Cambridge Primary Checkpoint can be used. Some of these are:

- To help learners understand more about their strengths and weaknesses in those subjects at the end of primary education and prior to secondary education.
- To help teachers, parents and learners identify strengths and weaknesses, which can then act as a basis for co-operative action planning.
- To give schools an international benchmark of learner performance to identify and address learning needs.
- It provides a transitional stage for IGCSE students by developing learners' skills and understanding in Mathematics, English and Sciences and provide an excellent preparatory ground for future IGCSE examination.

Our learners once again excelled in the Cambridge Year 6 checkpoint examination. A total of 147 students sat for these tests.

Mathematics

An average of 38/50 was attained in the 2024 sittings (avg. 38/50 - 2023) compared to the International average of 31/50. A total of 61 students attained an outstanding score of between 41 – 50.

English

An average of 37/50 was attained in the 2024 sittings (avg. 36/50 - 2023) compared to the International average of 33/50. A total of 53 students attained an outstanding score of between 41 – 50.

Science

Science has continuously been the forte of our students and this is reflected in the sterling results attained every year. An average of 42/50 was attained in the 2024 sittings (avg. 42/50 - 2023) compared to the International average of 31/50. A total of 98 students attained an outstanding score of between 41 – 50.








Comparison of academic results for the years 2023 and 2024



- Introduction of new members in the Behavior Management Team (BMT) to understand and address students' needs and challenges. Holding programmes at year group


levels and in the assemblies to promote good manners, health and safety awareness.



- Emergency exit ramp Repairs completed on the ramp behind the campus leading to the classrooms; making it safe to use when required.




Challenges

a) Academics

- Students often choose subjects without informed career decisions, leading to midterm changes. These disruptions hinder their learning progress.
- Some learners have low entry grades and take subjects they're not qualified for. As a result, they struggle and perform poorly in their final exams.
- Maintaining discipline across the campus has been challenging.
- A disconnect exists between parents understanding of the school timetable and programs, allowing some students to exploit this gap and become truants.
- The 90% attendance policy should be reinforced with a specific policy targeting remedial lessons. Ensuring consistent attendance will help students fully benefit from extra support.

b) Sports

 There is a conflict between sporting fixtures and the academic timetable and therefore students tend not to be able to attend the sporting fixtures.
 Better planning required to ensure maximum participation in the fixtures.

a) Academics


- Expanding the inclusion of more students into mainstream classes and activities. Three students were integrated in mainstream classes for three subjects. i.e. Math, English and Science.

- Furniture Upgrade: The playgroup classes have been outfitted with new, child-friendly furniture: Tables in the shapes of trapeziums and beans to encourage collaborative learning and engagement accompanied by comfortable chairs designed with safety and ergonomics in mind for young learners.
- Foreign Languages Department: Our Languages Room has undergone a significant transformation, now featuring 14 brand-new computers dedicated to supporting students studying French, Gujarati and Kiswahili.

This upgrade marks a giant leap forward in language education, as students can now enhance their learning through interactive software, online resources, and multimedia tools. The integration of technology allows for:

- Interactive learning experiences through language apps, virtual immersion programs, and online exercises.
- Access to global resources, including authentic audio and video materials to improve listening and comprehension skills.
- Personalized learning where students can practice at their own pace, reinforcing their understanding outside the classroom.

Beyond academic benefits, the safety of our students and school property remains a top priority.

To ensure a secure and conducive learning environment, we have also installed two high-quality security cameras in the Foreign Languages Room. These will enhance supervision and safeguard both students and school equipment.




Student Population - OAM Kindergarten








Student Population – OAM Junior School

Achievements

a) Enrollments

- 6.9% growth in the total enrolments for the main programs.
- The BA (Hons) Business

Administration Program continues to show a steady growth in enrolments (33%). The BTEC programs have also experienced a significant growth with BTEC Business (14%) and BTEC IT (9%). The BSc. (Hons) Computing Program has also improved significantly at 7% compared to 2022/2023 where the program numbers were the same. This can be attributed to the Introduction of the Year 1 of the BSc. (Hons) Computing Program - University of Greenwich(UoG - UK).

The Impressive growth in the CHRP and CPA programs is as a result of the College effort to seek for sponsorship partnerships. The Partnership with I&M Foundation elevated the enrolments in the programs by 44% and 64% respectively.

Challenges

i. Stiff Competition

Declining numbers in the ACCA and ABE programs due to the stiff competition from Universities offering diploma/professional programs and Colleges offering similar professional programs at a cheaper fee. The ACCA numbers declined by 26% attributed to students shift to cheaper online learning providers. ACCA has also introduced a study Hub which is an exclusive digital platform providing free access to study materials for students globally.

The decline for ABE student numbers may be attributed to declining popularity of the program amongst students, parents and employers (due to alternative course options available) and recognition of the program in the country.

ii. ACCA Exam Uptake

This continues to be a major challenge whereby students do not sit

exams in the semester registered for the respective papers. This has affected the professional papers where very few students register for exams.

iii. Staff Turnover

High academic staff turnover continues to be a major challenge. This has affected service delivery since it takes some time to recruit staff who can teach UK professional qualifications. A lot of time is also used in recruitment, induction and training of the new staff. Staff are also not interested in working 40 hours a week; the preference is to teach part time or online or have flexible working hours.

iv. Sports

Low student participation: Sports is not compulsory in the College, therefore students are hesitant in taking part in sporting activities.



Higher Education Loans

Achievements

- Over the year, the Higher Education Loans committee has carefully evaluated applications and disbursed loans amounting to Ksh. 29 million.
- The committee has actively monitored outstanding loans, securing repayments of Ksh. 21 million for Higher Education Loans and ksh. 3.6 million for VOB Loans in 2024.
- Office staff have worked relentlessly, making calls, sending emails, and following up on overdue payments. Their determination has yielded encouraging results, and they are optimistic that this progress will continue.
- This year, the committee has reviewed over 60 applications, covering both new and renewal requests. (Of these, 12 new applications and 47 renewal application were approved), while one was declined for not meeting policy requirements.




- The Higher Education Loans committee has been assessing applications on a weekly or bi-weekly basis.
- The process involves verifying applications, calling in guarantors, and conducting necessary checks.
- In cases requiring further scrutiny, the committee has arranged in-person interviews.
- Applicants have been asked to provide alternative guarantors on multiple occasions.
- The Chairman and committee members have been actively addressing repayment challenges, including organizing a face-to-face meeting with several beneficiaries to discuss repayment plans.
- When physical meetings are not feasible, communication is maintained via phone or email.

- To connect with beneficiaries residing overseas or in remote locations, the HEL committee has sought assistance from various VOC Centres.
- Considerable effort has been made to trace older loans, review their repayment terms, and offer guidance to ensure repayment.

Challenges

- Recovering long-overdue loans remains a significant challenge, but the committee remains diligently committed to making progress. The table below shows the disbursed and recovery from the beginning.
- Some borrowers are uncooperative, with responses ranging from reluctance to inappropriate remarks. Despite this, the committee continues its efforts with patience and persistence.
- Encouraging guarantors to engage with applicants and ensure repayments has proven difficult, as responses remain minimal.
- Some applications fail to meet eligibility criteria due to poor academic performance or insufficient funding to cover the full cost of studies. This makes it challenging to convince students to pursue local education options.

Entrepreneur Fund

The Entrepreneur Fund continues to successfully support the growth of young businesses within the Oshwal Community.

Achievements

- To date the fund has received a total of 28 applications.



From 1G to 10G - Infrastructure Upgrade

Why the need for upgrade from 1G to 10G?

Upgrading from 1G to 10G offers substantial improvements in speed, efficiency, scalability and reliability for any organisation. It provides a future-proof foundation for growth and innovation, in an increasingly data-driven world.

The campuses have the following infrastructure in place:

• Desktops and Laptops

Operating multiple tasks at a time requires the need for faster data transfer allowing immediate access to various resources as required.

Projectors

Projectors are vital for learning. There is an increase in demand for high quality images and video streaming during class time and the upgraded network ensures this is possible without having to wait for uploads and downloads taking up valuable teaching time.

• Firewall

Integrating the firewall within the 10G network has been crucial for maintaining both high performance and robust security. The security of the infrastructure has also improved since the firewall is able to run threat scans much faster than before.

Servers

Data transfer between servers and other devices such as computers and laptops has drastically improved. A higher bandwidth network allows for high data traffic preventing bottlenecks and slowdowns.

CCTV cameras

The new technology has improved the video quality captured by the CCTV cameras by providing faster and more reliable data transfer. This has resulted in better image quality and smoother video playback.

• IP Telephones

Upgrading to 10G technology has provided faster, more reliable, and higher-quality telephonic communication between staff across the campuses.



All the above applications are being hosted on our servers and support over 3000 students and 600 staff. The upgraded infrastructure has made it easy, reliable and fast for ease of communication across the institution. In conclusion, with the implementation of the 10G network, the campuses can carry out their main activity, that is uninterrupted teaching and learning.


No more downtimes, a more robust network allowing better use of up-to-date teaching aids and software that require higher bandwidths to operate, ensuring teaching time is efficiently and effectively used.

The upgrade has seen a significant improvement when it comes to uploading and downloading student coursework, assignments and online exams.

At Junior High, before the implementation of 10G, the bandwidth available for data transfer was a maximum of 50TB. With the upgrade, the bandwidth has increased to 350TB, allowing for the network to be used intensively both in terms of data reception and transmission.



The 1G network could only handle a maximum of 55TB of data transfer at any one time in an 8 hour period.



With the implementation of the 10G network, over 300TB of data transfer has been achieved over an 8 hour period, allowing for multiple streams of data to travel through the network un-interrupted thus ensuring the various facets of the campus carry out their core activities at their maximum output.


