The trips were educative and a great success. Learners were very excited and had a lot to share about their experiences.














KG READING WORKSHOP (19th January 2022)




SENIOR HIGH -

BTEC ART AND DESIGN JANUARY 2022

The current BTEC Art and Design students have been progressing well with Unit A1: Skills Development. This is an Art Project that has all the assignments geared towards the theme of "ODYSSEY". Students have been conducting research work; both Primary and Secondary as part of the assessment objectives. The unit is an introductory unit that prepares students in Communication, Technical Skills Development, Problem-solving techniques as well as creative and critical thinking in execution of their work. The Unit Al submission is due on 31st January, 2022 while resubmission will take place 2 weeks after the feedback is issued to students after the assessment decisions are made by the assessor.

During this project, all the Art and Design students have been introduced to the foundational Art and Design topics which constitute the Elements and Principles of Art and Design as well as its application to various Art and design pathways such as Painting, Drawing, Sketching, Graphics among others. The Unit AI has also enabled the students to be introduced to new Art media as well as various techniques, processes and styles in rendering of artworks in order to enhance the students' technical skills. The second Unit A2: Pearson Set assignment shall be introduced to students in the beginning of February, 2022. This shall be a practical assignment which shall be guided by the assessor.



Back to School - January

The first day back to school represents new possibilities. It offers our learners new experiences, new friends, new knowledge and new skills. January 3rd 2022 marked the start of a new academic term at OAM while resuming in-person learning for the third time after the year 2020/2021 virtual learning. As the term commenced, our teachers were prepared to make the best out of it. They scheduled numerous meetings to re-evaluate our learners' needs — academic, social and emotional well-being.

During classes, they planned some fun games and icebreakers to kick off the week. Some of the activities included students designing their classroom boards, establishing classroom routines, making anchor charts, designing visual schedules and much more.

We also welcomed back a few school activities following a shutdown of some of our facilities which lasted for more than three months such as, the OAM swimming pool sessions.

















Kindergarten

There are so many special things about the younger years in a child's life at school. Our learners enjoy daily rhythm that includes group time, story time, outdoor play, meals and snacks, water time, naps, and most especially, lots of playtime. Making art, stacking blocks, reading books—help them explore their interests as they play and learn. Activities like sorting, counting, and measuring help their budding brains to grasp content such as, numbers, letters and much more. They also engage in pre-writing and pre-reading by scribbling on paper and turning pages in books.

































Reading

As educators we recognize that we must use a variety of approaches to teach because students learn to read in a variety of ways. Some learners require a visual approach; others need auditory models of learning. Some students also benefit from structured phonics; other students require a more language-based approach



































Entry Point: 'Ocean Treasures'

Our amazing learners made an Oshwal beach where they learnt all about the different sea creatures in the ocean. They participated in a variety of games like building sand castles, swimming in the inflated pool, sunbathing, riding their tricycles and making patterns in the sand using rakes.

They also watched a variety of rhymes on the smart board which were all about the different sea creatures. They had a lot of fun learning about ocean treasures.





























Entry Point: 'Once Upon a Time'

Our learners are exploring the fantastical world of fairy tales, folktales, fables and legends for their IEYC Unit 'Once Upon A Time'. This unit is dedicated to the theme of 'storytelling' and aims to foster an appreciation for reading. Storytelling is an important part of learning that teaches learners how to develop an understanding of different lives, people and scenarios. It helps learners develop empathy and learn about new things. It also teaches them the importance of language and helps them become more effective storytellers and eventually, excellent communicators.

Dressed in different characters, their teachers enacted a play about a princess trapped in the jungle. The learners later had a chance to participate in a show and tell activity describing the characters of the play to their peers.



























Entry Point 'Green Fingers'

According to the IPC this unit gives learners a chance to learn about plants. They will find out about the plants that grow in their local area, plants that grow in other countries, how different countries use plants and how to make watering devices.

As part of their Entry Point, our Year One learners had a lot of fun planting flowers and trees. This exercise will enhance their knowledge on the basic conditions plants need to grow. They also learnt about the importance of sunlight and how often plants need to be watered.





















Entry Point 'Existing, Endangered, Extinct'

In this unit our learners will have the opportunity to explore living things from tiny tadpoles to giant squids. They will explore living things in a variety of forms, investigate why there is so much variety of species of animals and learn how scientists sort, identify and classify the millions of species living today.

To encourage learning they carried out research classification of organisms.

In Science, they will be finding out:

- · How and why living things are classified
- · How a vertebrate and an invertebrate are different
- · What the parts of a plant are
- · How flowers attract insects
- · How plants reproduce
- · How seeds are spread
- · How to classify local plants and animals
- · About the effects of food chains in our locality
- · About friendly and unfriendly micro-organisms
- · How fungi are different from plants and animals
- · Why composting is good for the environment



















Investigation

"Which cup is the best insulator of heat?"

Energy is transferred from an object with a higher temperature to one with a lower temperature. Good insulators prevent energy from easily being transferred from one object to another.

All objects are made up of small particles that are in a constant state of motion. The particles that make up an object are held together by bonds. Insulators have strong bonds that hold their particles rigidly in place. Since particles in insulators don't move around easily, the amount of energy that is transferred to other particles is minimal. This prevents particles from gaining energy and increasing the temperature. Wool, dry air, plastics, and polystyrene foam are all examples of good insulators.

Materials that do not insulate well are called conductors. Conductors have loose bonds that allow particles to move easily and transfer energy from one particle to the next. Metals tend to be very good conductors.

To investigate the above concept our learners tested different materials to see how well they can keep hot or cold while recording the insulating properties observed. They prepared materials such as, stopwatches, aluminium foil, cloth, wool, cotton, bubble wrap, shredded paper and used ice cubes to time how long it took for the ice to melt in presence of the materials. They also learnt about the role that thermal insulation materials play in reducing heat transfer by conduction, convection and radiation, as well as the design and implementation of insulating materials in construction.

Also during the unit, learners were given a challenge to choose an appropriate way to investigate a scientific issue. They were to solve a puzzle from the Entry Point crime scene. The evidence collected was a shoe therefore, they designed and carried out a fair test to find out which shoes have the least friction.

























Exit Point 'Growing Up'

This unit gives learners an opportunity to learn about their bodies and the changes that will happen both inside and out. They will learn:

- ·how the male and female bodies grow and develop
- ·about the changes that take place during puberty
- ·about different views that some cultures and countries have about growing up.

It is also a platform to discuss teenage issues with learners regarding their well-being during the stages of adolescence.

During this Entry Point, the school invited a medical expert, Dr. Lucy to help share with the learners' information regarding their health and body.







Learning with LEGO

Learners are born curious and eager to learn. The early years of LEGO in Kindergarten stimulates their natural curiosity while encouraging them to learn through play.

Using LEGO bricks is the perfect opportunity for building fine motor skills. When learners work in teams during class they are able to build the creative skills they would need to learn in dramatic play or from using toys, this helps in building their skills in storytelling and improves their competency in language.



























Time

Telling the time is a core numeracy skill that learners need to understand in their early years of learning. From reading the time to the hour on a clock face to converting analogue time to digital time. Some of the core skills include matching digital and analogue time, calculating time intervals, reading the 24-hour clock and writing time.

They also need the measure of time to grasp how it relates to their own experiences.

To encourage them to explore more about time our learners made their own clocks relating them to the activities they perform at school:

*Mentioning the time at different points in the day. Such as, 'it's 10:

20 a.m. - time for break,' or 'it's 7:45 a.m. - time for class.'

























Entry Point 'Homes and Houses'

According to the IPC, this unit gives learners a chance to learn about different kinds of houses and homes. They will find out about animal homes and learn about special kinds of homes.

For their Entry Point they made houses using recycled materials.































Global Perspectives Recycling - Art class

As educators, teaching students about recycling encourages them from a young age to be conscientious. They are inspired to have positive environmental skills.

Global Perspectives is a unique programme that helps students to develop outstanding 21st century skills, including critical thinking, research, analysis, evaluation, reflection, collaboration and communication. It strengthens the links across all of the other subjects in the junior and senior programme, including English, Mathematics and Science.

It also gives learners the opportunity to develop the skills that they need to be successful at school and university as well as in their future careers. The emphasis is on developing students' ability to think critically about a range of global issues where there is always more than one point of view.

In today's climate, it's more important than ever to understand the importance of recycling and preventing waste to reduce human environmental footprint. There's already a momentum around reducing waste and recycling, but with the help of the education sector, the impact is profound.















Scouts Training (Sungura cubs and pre-investiture scouts)

Scouting in Kenya began on 24th November 1910 when St. John's Church Pumwani Troop in Nairobi was formed. The Kenya Scouts Association is a registered member of the World Organization of Scouting Movement (WOSM).

It is the largest Scout Movement in Kenya and ranked 6th in the world with over 1.3 Million boys and girls Scouts with a support team of over 40,000 Scout Leaders.

Scout Sections: There are four main sections of scouting in Kenya:

- 1. Sungura Scouts (cub Scouts) 6 11 years
- 2. Chipukizi Scouts (Junior Scouts) 12 15 years
- 3. Mwamba Scouts (senior Scouts) 16 18 years
- 4. Jasiri Scouts (Rovers) 19 26 years

Sungura is the Swahili word for rabbit and the section is the equivalent of cub scouts. Sungura Scouts wear a yellow scarf with the Kenya Scout Associations logo printed on it. There are boy and girl versions of the Sungura Scout Uniform as well as an Air Scout and Casual Dress alternative. The Sungura stage is aimed at instilling the fundamental basics of Scouting in the young person and fostering the spirit of brotherhood, respect for God, and patriotism.

When a learner shows an interest in joining Sungura Scouts they enter a pre-investiture period where they learn the fundamentals of the section. This includes learning the Sungura Scout: Law; Promise; Motto; Salute and Sign and a brief history of Scouting within Kenya.























International Middle Years Curriculum (IMYC)

The IMYC consists of 33 units, with subject tasks that connect to an overarching Big Idea. The Big Idea challenges students to think beyond a topic by elevating the theme to a broader concept, enabling them to make connections with other subjects.





















Arts and STEM

STEM covers a broad range of careers, many of which have high projected growth and earning potential. The demand for soft skills has led to new models of learning to help prepare those aspiring to enter the fields of science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) to meet the evolving needs of today's workforce.

Proficiency in the arts are particularly important to engineers and computer scientists in emerging industries, such as themed experiences, gaming, and simulation and training, as a result, the acronym STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math) has been developed by educators.





Art

Involvement in Art is associated with improvement in math, reading, cognitive ability, critical thinking, and verbal skill. Art can also improve motivation, concentration, confidence, and teamwork. Using arts subjects as a learning tool, incorporating arts into other core classes produces impressive outcomes.











Music

Nearly everyone enjoys music, whether by listening to it, singing, or playing an instrument. But despite this, our students explore it as a passion and as a future career. OAM offers a class based music program and an advanced level through the help of our peripatetic team. This is after considering how such educational programs enrich students' lives and education.

Some of the great merits of music include:

1. Excellent mastery skills: Even when performing with sheet music, student musicians are constantly using their memory to perform. The skill of memorization can serve students well in education and beyond.

2. Increased coordination: Students who practice with musical instruments improve their hand-eye coordination. Just like playing sports, learners can develop motor skills when playing music.











Mathematics

One of the integral parts of Mathematics is Geometry, which further consists of 2D and 3D geometry. There are several concepts in 2D Geometry that require that students understand their application in the real practical world to enable them to recall, visualize, and identify the mathematical problems and solve them.

To increase students' attention to mathematical concepts and techniques, diverse modes of interactive geometry have to be put in place to help students learn and explore geometric concepts by manipulating geometric objects such as dots, lines, circles, and much more.


