


MEET & GREET



This unit gives our Year Six learners a chance to learn about invention and development and what changes in technology mean to them, their communities, and the world.

They will find out:

- About the different types of technology they use in their daily lives.
- How to compose their own expressionist music.
- What makes someone an entrepreneur.
- Important inventions and discoveries from the past.
- About 'futurism' and creating their own piece of art in the futurist style.



Entry Point 'What is on the menu?'

This unit gives learners a chance to learn about how food is produced and prepared.

They will find out about:

- Popular food in history.
- How to make bread and butter.
- Different diets and food requirements.
- Local food and customs in their country.

To start off this exciting unit our Year three learners transformed the hall into a restaurant serving healthy meals.

They played roles such as hotel managers, waiters and waitresses, chefs, and much more.

They learned about the different elements in a menu and how to achieve a balanced diet while ordering food in a restaurant.

They will soon explore many skills during this unit.



Solids and Liquids

hings can exist in different states of matter. Our learners learnt about materials that can change state by heating and cooling.

Their teacher used milk as a perfect example by demonstrating it into two states of matter - liquid, solid, and back to liquid after melting.

Through shaking milk they were able to achieve butter which when melted in the microwave became liquid.



Entry Point 'Shake It!

Our Year Three learners definitely had fun making some delicious milkshakes. To complement the unit 'Shake it', they added strawberry fruits, sprinkles, and ice cream to the milkshakes.

They also learnt about the benefits of having a balanced diet and enough nutrients.

They wrote a diet plan that demonstrates a healthy diet; enough water, protein, carbohydrate, fruit, and vegetables.





Learning in focus: Milk processing and packaging.

The Year 3 learners have had great learning and fun in the IPC unit - Shake It!

Using milk as the main product, the learners have been conducting a variety of interesting experiments for example making butter, cheese, and milkshake to explore:

To celebrate their exit point, the learners visited a milk processing plant in Kikambala on 31st May.

- States of matter (solids, liquids, and gases).
- Reversible and irreversible changes.
- Solids that dissolve in milk.

The purpose of the trip was to:

- Identify the different types of milk products.
- Consolidate their learning on the journey of milk.
- Identify the benefits of milk to the human body.

Measurement Year 3

Mathematics is essential to everyday life, critical to science, technology, and engineering, and necessary for financial literacy and most forms of employment.

Knowledge in measurements provides a foundation for understanding models when building, approximating distance, and much more.

Our Year Three learners participated in a survey exercise at the basketball court. Each group was given the task of recording different angles of the court using a ruler

They later proceeded to class to discuss the different findings of their activity.





Our Year 4 learners enjoyed an incredible Entry Point to their new IPC unit, 'Vanishing Rainforest' which included dressing up as explorers and researchers. They also toured around the campus investigating a range of tropical plants.

Later, they turned their classroom into a rainforest! For their class project, the learners created models of plants and animals using recycled materials to add to their classroom display. Finally, they demonstrated their artistic skills by drawing beautiful pictures of rainforest animals.

The displays were amazing! For their exit point, the learners visited Watamu (Arabuko Sokoke Forest, Gede Ruins, Turtle Bay Resort & Kipepeo Project Farm – Watamu)

During this trip, they:

- Discussed how plants get what they need to thrive in a rainforest.
- Investigated the rainforest habitat (food chain and food web)
- Identified the different types of animals and plants found in a rainforest
- Investigated animal adaptations in the rainforest.
- Described the changes that happen to the rainforests over time.
- Explained causes of deforestation.
- Discussed what we can do to save, sustain and protect the rainforests.
- Explored interesting historical sites.

The learners also had an opportunity to apply their personal learning goals in the course of the trip thus enhancing their holistic learning and development.

Separation of salt and water

n this class experiment, students were required to separate a mixture of sand and salt, illustrating the fundamental means of separating a mixture of an insoluble material from one that is soluble.

They filled a test tube about halfway with the sand-salt mixture. Poured water into the test tube and used enough water to completely submerge the mixture.

They later stirred the mixture for a few minutes so that the salt dissolves in the water. The sand is insoluble, so it remained visible.

They placed a curled piece of cone shape filter paper on the funnel. The filter paper held back the sand and only allowed the salt solution to pass through it.

They later scraped off the salt crystals out of the crucible leaving a pile of sand and a pile of salt, having successfully separated the two from the mixture.

Investigating the Process of Boiling

Learners enjoyed investigating the process of boiling and recorded what they observed.

They enhanced their observation skills which is one of the key skills in the unit 'Making new materials'.







Day is celebrated each year on June 5th. The day provides a platform for students to learn about the environment, participate in conservation activities, and learn about ways to help save the world from total destruction.

With an objective to encourage general awareness and action for the environment our Kindergarten, Junior and Senior schools carried out different activities including tree planting campaigns, nature-inspired art exhibits, recycling initiatives, waste reduction initiatives, and even assemblies.

During the junior school assembly, the learners recited poems on environmental protection explaining the importance of plants. They later showcased the different projects they have been working on to mark the occasion.

It was evident that the learners had made collaborative efforts to celebrate the day to encourage a safer, more prosperous and equitable environment.

















anaging Junior School to Senior School transitions can be a daunting task for many parents.

The biggest change being managing the adolescent. An adolescent who needs to connect what they have been learning in Junior school with the academic demands of Senior School.

An adolescent who needs to take risks. An adolescent who has formed his or her circle of friends and finds it difficult to start new relationships when such friends exit to other schools at the end of Year 6.

And what does this mean to parents? There are five bridges that parents have to cross to successfully manage these transitions.

First, there is the administrative bridge to cross. This is where the parent gets clearance from the Junior school including documents like the school leaving certificate.

Secondly, we have the social bridge to cross. It is concerned with the pupil's induction process into the Senior School and takes the form of Year 6 taster classes, the production and issuing of booklets among others. The taster days provide the pupils with an insight of what to expect when they get to Senior School.

Curriculum bridge is another that many parents try to grapple with. Sharing plans that show what content is taught on either side of the transition is very crucial. This involves teachers teaching bridging units at the end of Year 6 and start of Year 7. OAM has made this possible through the IMYC that seamlessly transitions a child from IPC.

IMYC targets to bridge the divide between Primary and Secondary education. On one side of the bridge are the needs of the adolescent brain while the other side constitutes the academic rigour required to ensure learners are ready for the next stage of the secondary school.

Students are encouraged to learn about adaptability, balance, belief, celebration, challenge among other units to build the cognitive and soft skills required for a strong foundation to the IGCSE course. It is important that both sides of this

bridge are in place to help students become the best they can be. This usually places high demands on schools and teachers in terms of planning and managing resources.

A shared understanding of how pupils are taught is very important during transition. The Pedagogical Bridge ensures continuity in classroom practice as well as improving learning.

Then finally we have Managing learning. Endowing pupils and their parents with information about achievement and empowering them with the confidence to express their learning needs in this new environment called Senior school.

Transitions are an evolving concept as cohorts are different. The success of these will be determined by the effort each stakeholder has to put in.
